Saving Your Money

Life isn't complicated enough, right? The government has to step in and create a situation where each individual and small business must remain accountable for their financial activities and taxes!

Saving You Money!

It is hard to imagine that such a thing is possible, and indeed, the task of setting money aside in a "savings" instrument is something that only 10% of the Canadian population seem to be able to do these days. After all, how can anyone think about putting aside money for the future when the present is financed from paycheck to paycheck? Some can, many cannot.

Well, there are other ways to think about "saving you money" than just the traditional methods of setting money aside.

For example, everyone in Canada should be aware that, even while earning income from employment, an individual may operate a small side-business. This allows you to claim deductions for expenses that you are already incurring, and reduce your taxes owing on your total income. These side-enterprises do not necessarily have to be profitable either. There simply has to be a reasonable expectation of profit. So you are spending money on cell phones, internet, cable, vehicle, magazines, education, and more! Why not deduct these expenses from your income?

Self-Directing Your Taxes!

The tax treatment of charitable donations is a very complicated issue to present and understand, and is misunderstood by almost every Canadian except those wealthy enough to have Tax Accountants explain it to them. Let's put it this way:

- for every \$1 you contribute, you effectively get a \$1.29 tax credit for everything over \$200 contributed in the year.
- so, if you were to contribute \$1000 to charity, you would get an effective tax credit of \$200 for the first \$200, and \$1032 for the subsequent \$800 contributed, for a total tax credit of \$1232.
- so why send your dollars to the government in the form of taxes, when you can fund the programs and services that you care about through charitable donations? (Just be sure that the donation is made to a federally registered organization and you get an "official" receipt).

We don't understand this because of where the tax credit appears on the tax form. That's how simple it is.

The more things change...



Has your workplace switched to new software? Worried about the hassle of learning to do everything over again from scratch? Don't worry. **You don't have to.**

Once you learn some common tools in one software, you can transfer these skills to almost any other program. Just as two different makes of cars will look different but have mostly the same steering, braking, gear shifting, windshield, radio and heat controls, two brands of software may have different colours and words for things, but you 'drive' them the same way. Once you get the hang of these basic features and commands, it will be almost as easy to 'drive' different computer programs as it is to drive different makes of cars.

Common Tools At the top of the screen in most software is a grey bar containing words such as 'File', 'Edit', 'Window' and 'Help'. It's called the menu bar. The menus usually contain the full set of things that are possible to do with the software. The File menu has commands for opening, closing, saving, importing and exporting files, and often things like page set up for word processing programs. The Edit menu contains commands like copy and paste. The help menu will allow you to look at whatever help or manual is available. Almost all help menus also have an 'about' item that you can click on to see what version of the program

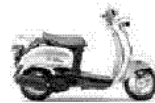
you are using, which can be useful to know for tech support or compatibility with other software.

Underneath the toolbar is usually a bank of buttons that do the smaller number of things most people usually want to do with the software. These are usually things like print to the most commonly used printer, save the file you are working on, start a new file or open an existing file. All the commands you see on the buttons are usually also in the menus, they're just more accessible, kind of like a mini-menu.

When you click with the right mouse button in various locations on the screen, a lot of programs will have what are called 'context sensitive menus'. These contain the commands that most people want to do when they are at the part of the screen you are clicking on. Give it a try in one of your programs and see if there are different menus depending on whether you click over top of the menus, toolbars or in the 'business area' of the screen. I think of these as the 'daily specials', menus that change depending on where you are.

So the next time you are confronted with a new program on your computer, remember you already know how to use 'software', it's just the little differences of this particular one you'll need to become more familiar with. It's as easy as driving a new car.
